Celebrate the Lord's nativity Dec. 24 at 7:30 and Christ's birthday on Dec. 25 at 11am

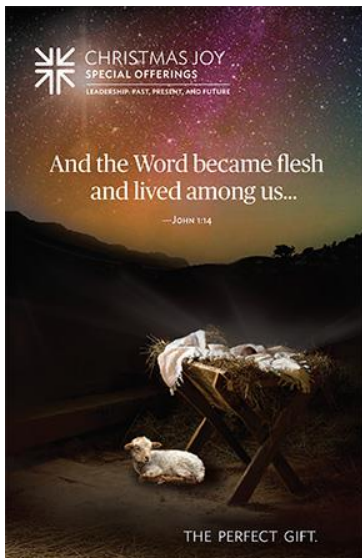

Advent is a Season for Preparing

- **Hang New Curtains**

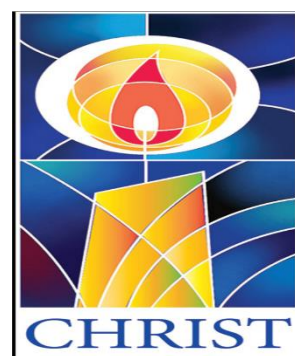

FUPC SERVES THE LORD AND THE WORLD



Thank you to everyone who helped make Thanksgiving dinner special for members of the Edinboro community. Your generosity supplied 30 grocery bags with all the extra treats needed for a delicious Thanksgiving dinner. The bags were distributed by the Edinboro food pantry. Thank you to Jan Schulz for organizing this mission project.

Our church has once again joined other community churches in giving gifts to kids whose families rely on the Edinboro Food Pantry. 30 gift tags were provided to our congregation by the Edinboro Kiwanis who organizes this annual program. The gift tags that were displayed on our tree provided the age and size of each child and a small wish list. Members of FUPC purchased gifts and returned them to the church. Kiwanis distributes all the gifts to the families in time for a Merry Christmas.



In November, FUPC also generously supported The Warming Center coordinated by The Mental Health Association of Northwestern PA. The Warming Center opens from 11 PM to 7:30 AM when temperatures are 20° or below. Men, women, and families who are homeless, or otherwise unable to have shelter through the night, can come in from the cold to get warm, have something to eat, talk to someone, watch a movie and above all, be safe.

Compassion is Active

Christians are sometimes accused of being so heavenly minded that they are no earthly good. We get caught up in choir rehearsals, studies of the end times, or other church activities, and ignore the needs around us. When problems are brought to our attention, we content ourselves with feeling sorry about them while doing nothing. But sympathetic thoughts or kindly musings are not true compassion.

With the divine power he possessed, Jesus could have met the multitude's needs merely by forming a thought or speaking a command. He could even have done it from heaven without coming to earth. But his compassion caused him not only to come and live and die among us, but also to touch lepers (Mark 1:40-41) and blind men (Matthew 20:34), and to take little children in his arms (Mark 10:13-16). True compassion is personal, active involvement that expresses God's merciful heart in words and deeds.

God's chosen people are to "clothe" themselves with compassion (Colossians 3:12). We are to meet others' needs, not to continually satisfy our selfish desires. As God showers us with comfort through his Word and through other believers, we in turn are to redirect the stream of mercy to others. We are not to hoard God's love, but to overflow with the good news of his compassion to all. *-Barbara Bush, a pastor's wife and mother of four children.*

Let There Be Light!

You may have noticed an improvement in the parking lot and driveway lighting. On November 10th, just before the weather turned cold and snowy a lighting project, recently approved by Session, was accomplished which has made a significant improvement in the safety, security, and aesthetics of the church.

The effort, coordinated by Art Crawford saw the old “box style” area lights on the drive retrofitted from metal halide lighting to **LED**. Many of the old fixtures and lamps had failed with only a few still working. The job was performed by Jay Megat of the former *Chernichky Electric* and accomplished in one day. All the fixtures and poles were cleaned, painted, and repaired in preparation for the **LED** installation.

The installation cost of \$1608 will be recovered in about 17 months through the energy savings and reduced operating costs for the lights which equated to an 88% return on investment. The **LED** lamps were acquired through a donation.
