Vacation Bible School is almost here, July 11-15

Take part in VBS, as a student or as a volunteer

Our Edinboro Community Vacation Bible School happens this month! We at Edinboro Presbyterian are happy to be among the multiple congregations who will combine again to bring back a new VBS after the event was sidelined the past two years.

Dozens of children are already pre-registered for our combined VBS. This year it will be held at the social hall at Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church in Edinboro. The dates have moved later in the summer, to avoid overlapping with similar events which a few other congregations will hold in June. Ours will be weekday mornings, July 11-15.

With our relaunch for 2022, we are needing some additional volunteers. Your help will be greatly appreciated. Several roles are available, one of which could match your preferences and availabilities. If you are not available all five mornings, we can work with your schedule to find 1 or 2 or 3 days you could assist with something important. (Speak with Marilee Wnek, Marcia Cooke, Greg Gillispie or Sue Johnson if you can assist in whatever way.)


Also, even if you are not in an “official” capacity for a volunteer, it would be great to have several folks from FUPC on hand to greet people between 8:20 and 9:00 on the first day, creating a positive first impression on Monday 7/11 and/or attending the wrap-up program on Friday 7/15, starting about 11:30.

The theme for this multi-church VBS is “Food Truck Party: On a Roll with God.” It invites children to pray as Jesus teaches us in Matthew 6:11 – “Give us this day our daily bread.” These words serve as a reminder that everything we have comes from God — and that it's by turning to God in prayer that all of our daily needs are met.

Each day will focus on either an Old Testament or New Testament story where the Bible talks about food:

- Manna and Quail: Exodus 16
- The Widow’s Endless Oil: 1 Kings 17
- Eating the Good Stuff: Daniel 1
- Jesus Feeds 5000: John 6
- Breakfast on the Beach: John 21

From the Pastor

“S u m m e r t i m e . . . ” “and the [Christian] living is easy” (So they say)

As the month of July dawns, I am astounded that summer seems nearly half over. Admittedly, Independence Day Weekend is only one-third of the way to Labor Day Weekend, but for individuals and families whose lives revolve around the school calendar, much of August will include activities ranging from pre-season sports and music practices to school shopping to actually starting classes before the month is out. For those folks, we really are at about the halfway point.

As for 2022, we are *literally* at the halfway point. Sure, February is shorter than other months, and more 31-day months are backloaded into the second half of the year, but July 2 is the midpoint (even in leap years). So it's time to take time to reflect and plan.

There are very few songs across history that “everyone” knows, but one which has a better-than-average mass recognition is the George Gershwin classic “Summertime”. (To date 1,161 recordings of that song have been officially released.) The lyrics, including “Summertime, and the livin’ is easy,” were written by DuBose Heyward, author of the novel upon which *Porgy and Bess* was based. The song’s style has been described as a spiritual lullaby.

On one level, it seems a bit odd for its story to speak to how the living is easy, your parents are beautiful and rich, and there is no need to cry...especially when the story also includes poverty, disabilities, racism, criminality and domestic abuse. The song, the opera version and the theatrical and movie portrayals balance out the negativity and the hope.

As we live out the Summer of 2022, you and I can focus on being mired in the realities of crime and poverty and hopelessness. Wars, literal and otherwise, rage on. Some people are not even able to talk with or listen to other people, because of the divisiveness of the surrounding culture. Anxieties over politics and the economy – and a long list of other things – could bring us to sing dirges instead of lullabies.

However, to do so would leave some of our best resources locked up and unused. Hope is a Christian virtue and a gift from God. Truth can carry us through the culture’s confusion. Justice works itself out. Unity is a goal – and a task to be accomplished. Love overcomes so much. Salvation is a promise fulfilled.

Please don’t let all the negativity drag you down with it. If you and I look around – *when* you and I look around, we can discover/rediscover that the “fish are jumping”, good things are happening, the people closest to us bring value to our lives, and each day and each breath is a gift from the Lord.

We see what we look at. We hear what we listen to. These are scientific, provable facts. They also are spiritual truths. If we were to fill our attention with all that is negative, then pessimism is the obvious result. However, when we look for beauty, or true riches, or serene evenings, that is where our awareness goes. When we sing happy songs, we stir happiness in our minds and our souls. Whenever we get away from the noise, we become more able – and more eager – to hear God’s loving lullaby which reminds us that all will be well.

Life is hard. Sure. Yes, it is. But for those of us who have put our lives into God’s hands, the living is easy. Take very specific time this summer, or even this very week, to bask in that confidence and calmness. Our Now, our Short-term Future, our Eternal Future – are safely entrusted to the God of hope and truth and justice and unity and love. Salvation is for forever, and its implications are valid and active even now

- *Buy or use your own “thinking of you” or “have a happy/blessed day” card from home, and deliver it to FUPC.*



Prayer suggestions, for our PRAYER, CARE, and CONNECTIONS

When a group of congregational leaders held a half-day planning and discernment retreat earlier this year, they sought to hone in on the factors which lead toward fruitful, faithful ministry. The process developed three primary areas with which we can decide what activities to do, how to determine priorities on which to center, and how to evaluate our mission and ministries.

That group process led us to three directions which we can hold in tandem: upward, inward, outward. The first relies on PRAYER – asking God for guidance and blessing, and listening for the directions which our Lord would have us take. Some of those will be familiar, some may reclaim past goals, and some will take us into uncharted territory. Second is INWARD CARE – staying connected with one another, those who have found a home in this household of faith. The outward direction leads us into MISSION AND OUTREACH – sharing our faith, demonstrating our hope, and connecting with our neighbors and their needs.

The pyramid image is one visual representation of how these goals interconnect and build upon each other. For this month, here are daily prayer recommendations. The emphasis for the month ties together prayer (obviously) and the community connections goal.



- Mondays: For our outreach as a congregation.
- Tuesdays: For our faith sharing/demonstration as individuals.
- Wednesdays: For other congregations in Edinboro and the area.
- Thursdays: For people who have fallen away from God.
- Fridays: For the next five new members of this congregation.
- Saturdays: For innovation, boldness, and other-centeredness.

FUPC's summer sanctuary worship begins at **10:00 a.m.** for June, July, August & Labor Day Weekend. We have used this seasonal transition for multiple years. Many people like the earlier start, which then opens up other options for the rest of Sunday. We do recognize that the switch from 11:00 a.m. does put limits and hardships on other people though.
